'The Ballad of Father Gilligan' is a simple and meaningful poem written by W.B.Yeats, one of the noted figures of 20th century literature. The poem tells the moving story of the Almighty's timely intervention in the life of an earnest priest. The poem also depicts the theme of poverty and extreme religiosity of the Irish rural life.

Father Gilligan is an old priest. Once he failed to perform the last communion to the sick man. To get away from the probable damnation, he rushes to the sick man's house on a horse back keeping his life at stake. On reaching the house he was too started to find that the man had already died. He cries in alarm as he realized that God had sent one of his angels to do his duty to save him from eternal damnation and also to give salvation to the poor man. Father Gilligan praises the glory of God. He compares him to a priest whose parish is the whole universe. He proclaims that for all the labours we have taken, God has unfailing sympathy and care stored for us.

The poem is a literary-ballad. It is a homage to the traditional Irish poetry. The poem is rich with imageries. The poem follows the rhyme scheme ABCB. The word choice is simple and clear. The poet uses many figures of speech like simile, metaphor. Etc to make the poem interesting to the readers.
