### Summary of the 1 to 10 stanzas:



He said that it was his body, not his mind that made him say so. He knelt. Leaning on a chair, he started praying. He fell asleep there. Night came. Stars appeared in the sky. Father Gilligan could not go to the poor man's house. He was very weak. So he knelt down and prayed. He leaned in the chair and slept. Night came. Millions of stars appeared in the sky. Next morning, he got up. He rode to the poor man's house on his horse very fast. Father Gilligan was sorry for he could not go previous night. When he reached there, the poor man's wife was surprised to see Father again. She said that the man had already passed away and that he was happy at the time of death because of the comfort given by Father Peter Gilligan. Father Gilligan cried out in joy, saying that God heard his words and sent down an angel to do his job for him.




