"Adventures in a Banyan tree" is a beautiful story written by the Indian writer Ruskin Bond. The author conveys the idea that nature gives endless pleasure to human beings. The major characters of the story are a boy who is the lover of nature, a beautiful Banyan tree which gives a lot of happiness to man, a clever mongoose and a skilful cobra.

The Banyan tree was the domain of the boy. There a small grey squirrel became his friend. The Squirrel often took food from his hands. Birds of all kinds visited the tree during the fig season. The boy built a small platform halfway up the tree where he read his favourite books. One day he witnessed a cobra- mongoose fight. The mongoose and the cobra came face to face. A myna and a crow also witnessed the fight and tried to play a part in it. Finally the mongoose won the battle and dragged the cobra into the bushes. The boy reported this event to his grandfather. Grandfather became very happy when he knew that the mongoose had won.

It starts admiring itself and slithers down towards the mirror. Homeopath runs out for his life. Next day he returns to his room and finds his belongings robbed by some thief. The thief left only one thing behind - the homeopath's dirty vest.

Lines Written In Early Spring

The poem 'Lines Written in Early Spring' is a beautiful poem by the wellknown nature poet William Wordsworth. The poem deals with the theme of coexistence, peace and pleasure in nature and the cruelties in the human world. The poet once sits in a grove in a relaxed mood enjoying sights and

sounds. He sees there various kinds of plants and flowers coexist. Birds hop and play around him to express their thrill of pleasure. The sights and sounds in nature bring pleasant thoughts into his mind. Nature links human souls to her fair works; still humans thoughtlessly destroy nature. When the poet thinks of human activities, he becomes very sad.

He believes every flower enjoys the air it breathes and the twigs spread their fans to catch breezy air. He thinks that there is pleasure everywhere in nature. The poet says that coexistence is Nature's holy plan. But he laments over the cruelties of man against nature and amongst his own kind.

The poem deals with the theme of coexistence, peace and pleasure in nature and the cruelties in the human world. The poet once sits in a grove in a relaxed mood enjoying sights and sounds. He sees there various kinds of plants and flowers coexist. Birds hop and play around him to express their thrill of pleasure. The sights and sounds in nature bring pleasant thoughts into his mind. Nature links human

souls to her fair works; still humans thoughtlessly destroy nature. When the poet thinks of human activities, he becomes very sad.

He believes every flower enjoys the air it breathes and the twigs spread their fans to catch breezy air. He thinks that there is pleasure everywhere in nature. The poet says that coexistence is Nature's holy plan. But he laments over the cruelties of man against nature and amongst his own kind.

The lines 'To her fair works did Nature link...'; 'every flower enjoys the air it breathes', and 'The budding twigs spread out their fan, To catch the breezy air' are examples of Personification. There is the figure of speech hyperbole in the expression 'a thousand blended notes. 'What man has made of man' is an example of Alliteration. The poem ends with a Rhetorical Question: "Have I not reason to lament / What man has made of man?" An example of the Auditory Image is there in "I heard a thousand blended notes." The 'breezy air' brings to our mind a 'Tactile Image' as well. Some Visual Images are flowers (primrose, periwinkle), birds, grove, bower, budding twigs, etc. The Rhyme Scheme of the poem is ABAB.

UNIT SUMMARY

The unit consists of an article 'Project Tiger' by the great filmmaker and writer Satyajit Ray, the initial scenes of the feature film Children of Heavenas a screenplay 'My Sister's Shoes', by Majid Majidi, a renowned Iranian filmmaker and the song, 'Blowin' in the Wind' by Bob Dylan.

Project Tiger is an extract from 'Childhood Days', a memoir by the renowned filmmaker Satyajit Ray. It tells us how he managed to shoot the scenes of a film in which a tiger was a character. The memoir reveals the stress and strain involved in the process of filmmaking.

The problem of a boy after he loses his sister's pair of shoes is the central theme of the film. The theme has a universal value and hence the film was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film in 1998.

Ali (Amir Farrokh Hashemian) loses the only pair of shoes his little sister Zahra (Bahare Seddiqi) owns and their attempts to hide the news from their poverty-stricken father (Mohammad Amir Naji) and ill mother (Fereshte Sarabandi). They devise a scheme to share Ali's pair of worn sneakers until they can find a new pair of shoes for Zahra. This documentary-like film gives the pathetic living conditions of the people in some parts of Iran.

Blowin' in the Wind

Bob Dylan's Blowin' in the Wind is a song of protest that invokes the spirit of the oppressed to wake up and assert their will and dignity against ageold oppression and exploitation. Through a series of questions and their answer which recurs like a refrain, the singer creates a highly motivating and greatly inspiring mood that turns out to be something like a marching song of the oppressed. Through exhortation, the poet is making a plea for the eradication of inequality and injustice.

LESSON SUMMARY

Project Tiger

PROJECT TIGER is a memoir by Satyajit Ray, the famous Indian filmmaker. He begins his article by paying respect to the Hollywood filmmakers for giving much reverence and consideration to the animal actors. There is no film company better than Hollywood to make movies using animals. He remembers some of the movies, he saw during his childhood. In it, he highlights the acting of Rin Tin Tin, a dog. These dogs are not only well-known actors in films, but they are also well-paid. He remembers seeing the shooting of a movie 20 years ago in a Disney Studio. The main character in the movie is a big dog. The shooting hadn't started. The cameraman was making arrangements to start the shooting. He demanded that everyone be in their place. Then to Ray's astonishment, something very strange happened. A dwarf appeared. He was followed by a man with the dog's fur. He put the fur on the dwarf. He was seen walking like a dog on four legs from the marked area. Only then did Ray realize that the dwarf was the dupe of that big dog.

The animals in Hollywood movies are well-trained. It is not difficult to train a horse or dog. But what about training crows (ravens)? This was also possible in Hollywood. When Alfred Hitchcock was trying to make a film titled 'Birds', about 100 ravens were cast in it. The theme of the film is that birds from all over the world attack humans. He advertised in various newspapers in the United States searching for trained ravens. So someone came up with about 100 ravens. These ravens would obey certain commands.

It is not impossible to shoot films with animals if you are patient. But it was not very easy. Remember how Ray used the dog in Pather Panchali. Have you ever thought of making a movie using the tiger in it?

He narrates his experience and efforts in shooting a film titled 'Goopy Gyne Bagha Byne' using a tiger as a character. In the film, Goopy was banished by a king to a forest. He wanders into the forest and meets Bagha who is also banished. Then they see a tiger and freeze. But the tiger simply walks about in the forest without paying them any attention. This was the scene to be shot.

Ray needed a tiger for shooting the film. It was very difficult to get a trained tiger in India for shooting. So he decided to contact a circus company to get a tiger. At that time 'Bharat Circus' was giving shows in Marcus Square in Calcutta. Ray and his team approached the circus manager and informed the purpose of their visit.

After many discussions, the manager agreed to provide the tiger. He asked Mr Throat who was the ringmaster to put the tiger in its cage and send it in a lorry to the shooting location. The ringmaster had never let the tiger out of the cage freely on his own.

After two days of travel, the lorry with two well-fed tigers reached the bamboo grove in Notun Gram village, where the shooting was to take place. A few villagers took permission to watch the shooting. In the scene, the tiger had to come out of the bamboo grove into the open space, walk gently for a while, look at the camera and then go back.

The camera was placed on the tripod and it faced the bamboo grove. The actors Goopy and Bagha were ready to be within yards of the camera. A five-

foot iron rod was fixed on the ground. A thin long wire was fixed to the tiger's collar and another end was tied to the rod. When the door of the cage was opened, the tiger responded quickly. It jumped out and paced around. The ringmaster tried to control it but it was a futile attempt. At last, when the tiger calmed down, a few shots were taken. But the shot did not come out perfectly because the camera failed somehow.

Then, Satyajit Ray and his team found another bamboo grove near Boral village in Calcutta. The lorry arrived with the tiger once more. There were so many villagers to watch the film shooting. The crowd was not ready to move from the shooting place. When the door of the cage was opened the tiger emerged with a roar and rushed towards the villagers. All disappeared frantically from the scene. But the tiger soon calmed down. The shooting was completed successfully.

My Sister's Shoes

Ali and Zahra are the two important characters in the screenplay 'My Sister's Shoes'. Ali is Zahra's brother. Ali has gone to the market to get vegetables and stitch Zahra's worn-out shoes. When the film begins, Ali is seen getting his sister Zahra's pink shoes from the cobbler after repairs. He then goes to the bakery to collect nan. From the bakery, he moves to the vegetable shop with two packets. One is his packet of Nan and the other is his sister's shoes. He leaves the packets outside the shop to buy some potatoes. While he picks up the potatoes, a junk collector takes the packet of shoes, thinking of it as garbage and moves away. In a frantic effort to find them, Ali overturns the crates of vegetables. The annoyed shopkeeper Akbar chases him away.

Ali belongs to a poor family with many financial troubles. So, he is reluctant to tell his parents about the lost shoes. Ali tells Zahra about the lost shoes and begs her not to tell their parents. He was scared that his father would beat him, and his father could not afford another pair of shoes. Ali feels very guilty about it and tries to pacify his sister Zahra. Zahra is heartbroken as she did not have another pair of shoes to go to school. The children are aware of the poor conditions of the home. Their mother is unwell and their father has no work. They have a baby to take care of too. Hence they hide the news from their parents. Ali is so sad seeing his sister cry. Suddenly Ali gets an idea. He offers his pair of old sneakers until he finds a new pair of shoes for his sister and Zahra agrees.

The children are seen writing out their conversations in a book. They pass the book to each other quietly so that they do not disturb their parents. The film throws light on the pathetic conditions of a certain section of Iranian society. It is a story of innocence, compassion and the goodness that exists in human society. The story tells of the bond that the children share between them and their strong relationship.

<u>Blowin' in the Wind</u>

'Blowin' in the Wind' is a song written by the American poet Bob Dylan. This poem has been described as a protest song and poses a series of rhetorical questions about peace, war, and freedom. The refrain 'The answer, My friend, is blowin' in the wind' has been described as "ambiguous: the answer is as intangible as the wind". All through the song Dylan asks the dictators of Man that how many wars a man needs to wage before he can realize his true identity. How many peace treaties does Man have to sign before the violence in the wars will cease? Dylan alludes to the Biblical reference to Noah sending a pair of doves, to find a land where there is peace and is fit to be habituated.

Dylan creates a striking antithesis through the metaphor of 'doves' and 'cannon balls'. He explicitly states the desperate condition of Man as he pretends not to hear the agonies of the warvictims, their pleas and cries, their sorrows and destitute. Dylan urges each of us not to hunt for the answer but just to listen empathetically as the answer is all around us blowing in the wind.

In the lines of the first stanza, the poet throws light on the belief system prevailing in those days. It was believed that a boy can become a man only after going to war.

When will these people become free? - is the question that he poses. Most people turn their ears and heads away pretending that they do not see anything going around. How can a man turn a blind eye is another question that he asks. Again he says that the answer to this question is blowing in the wind which means it is everywhere and known to everyone.

In the concluding stanza, the poet wonders how many times will a man have to face wars and how many more people would have to lay down their lives before people's quest for freedom is fulfilled. He wants to know when man's plea for peace will be heard by the government.

Dylan begins each stanza with a question which is followed by two more. They are rhetorical questions some gentle, some very critical. This is intended to make the listeners think. Then he hits us with his refrain which is ambiguous. The technique is repeated throughout the song. Through this song, Dylan aims at sensitizing our conscience. He wishes to say that enough evil has been done in the world. It is about time that man wakes up and decides to put an end to all this and live a life of freedom, peace and liberty.
