Notes for Students: A Very Old Man with Enormous Wings by Gabriel Garcia Marquez

Summary (Short and Simple):

The story is about an old man with wings who appears in a village after a storm. Pelayo and Elisenda, a couple, find him in their courtyard. He looks weak, dirty, and unable to move because of his large wings. At first, they think he is a shipwrecked sailor, but a neighbor says he is an angel. Meanings of Important Words (Simple Explanations):

1. **Enormous** (Page 1): Very big or huge.

2. Impeded (Page 1): Blocked or stopped from moving.
