SECTION A: READING (20 Marks)

Passage 1 (Discursive/Unseen) — 10 Marks

For a long time, many students believed that science was something to be learned only from a textbook, memorised the night before a test, and then forgotten soon after. Science fairs are quietly changing this idea, giving students a chance to ask their own questions, build their own models, and discover that science can be exciting rather than just another subject to pass.

Consider Riya, a student of Class 8, who wanted to know why the water from her school garden's tap sometimes looked muddy after heavy rain. Instead of simply asking her teacher for the answer, she decided to build a small working model of a water filter for the school science fair, using sand, gravel, charcoal and an old plastic bottle. Her model did not work perfectly on the first try, and she had to change the arrangement of the layers twice before the water finally came out clear. Riya later said that this struggle taught her far more about filtration than any single chapter in her science book ever had.

Stories like Riya's are common at science fairs, where the real value lies less in prizes and more in the process itself. Students learn to observe a problem carefully, form a guess about its cause, test their idea, and improve their work when it does not succeed the first time. Along the way, they also learn to work in teams, manage limited time and materials, and explain their ideas clearly to visitors who stop by their stall — skills that are just as valuable as the science itself.

Organising a good science fair does take effort. Teachers usually give students several weeks to plan their projects, encourage the use of simple, low-cost or recycled materials instead of expensive kits, and pair younger students with slightly older 'mentor' students who can guide them. Some schools have also started inviting local engineers or college students to walk around during the fair, answering questions and suggesting small improvements to the young exhibitors' projects.

What makes science fairs truly worthwhile is the shift they bring about in how students see science itself. A subject that once seemed distant and full of difficult formulas suddenly becomes something a student can touch, build and even get wrong before getting right — and that hands-on curiosity, once sparked, rarely fades away.

Passage 2 (Case-based/Factual) — 10 Marks

Every year in November, Silver Hills Public School holds its Annual Sports Day, a day the students look forward to as much as their winter holidays. Three years ago, the school's Sports Committee noticed something they wanted to change: while boys signed up eagerly for track and field events, very few girls came forward to compete, often saying they felt shy or feared losing in front of the whole school.

To address this, the school introduced a few simple changes. It added new events such as a shuttle relay and a skipping competition, which many girls said felt less intimidating than a straight sprint race. It also started a 'practice week' before the big day, where a physical education teacher helped interested students, regardless of skill level, practise together after school hours.

The Sports Committee kept a record of the number of girl students who took part in at least one event each year:

Year	Girl Participants
Year 1 (before changes)	22
Year 2 (changes introduced)	48
Year 3 (this year)	70

Teachers have noticed that the rise in participation has brought other benefits too — more students now stay back voluntarily for after-school games, and the school's under-14 girls' relay team, formed from Sports Day practice groups, recently won a medal at the district-level meet. A few parents did initially worry that practice sessions would affect study time, but the school addressed this by keeping practice week strictly limited to forty-five minutes after school, and results this year showed no drop in the class average marks.
